SOL Testing Schedule for May/June

Virginia Standards of Learning (SOL) tests are quickly approaching for grades 3 through 5.

Here are a few tips to help ease any test anxieties and to prepare your student for the test:

- -Encourage your child with lots of positive reinforcement.
- -Make sure your child is rested and well fed at test time.
- -Help your child develop a strategy for the test so he/she will feel a sense of control (use the scratch paper provided, narrow down your answer choices, skip questions that are too hard and come back to them later, create a multiplication chart, and remember how much you have accomplished this year)!
- -Remind your child that this test will not influence the report card; it's just a measurement for us to see how much they learned this year!
- -Remind your child to ignore the other students.
- -Encourage your child to shake off the test once finished.
- -Most importantly, let your child know you're behind him/her all the way!



CREATIVITY IN SEARCH


Although we as a society value the products of creative people, we often don't know how to recognize it or encourage that creativity in children. In the LCPS SEARCH program, teachers use Thinking Keys to guide students in using different kinds of thinking for different SEARCH lessons. Those keys, Perceiving, Connecting, Reasoning, Evaluating, and Creating, align with Bloom's Revised Taxonomy: Remembering, Understanding, Applying, Analyzing, Evaluating, and Creating. Because we all recognize that different tasks require different levels and types of thinking, we want to give students the opportunity to explore many avenues for successful problem solving in the classroom.

In SEARCH, we emphasize that creativity is a series of steps that can be practiced and, with perseverance, can be increased. Many lessons ask students not only to create, but then to go back and find ways to enhance and elaborate on their work. As they continue to work on projects, their confidence in their ability to "be creative" increases.


"Traditionally, creativity has been viewed as an easy process, something that people with certain traits were able to do while others without those traits could not. As our views of creativity have become more informed, we have come to appreciate the role of hard work and revision in the process." Joyce VanTassel-Baska, Ed.D., College of William and Mary, 2004

Paul Torrance, the "Father of Creativity" identified four elements to creativity which he believed could be used to identify both creative thinkers and creative products: Fluency (the number of ideas generated), Flexibility (variety of ideas), Originality (uniqueness of ideas), and Elaboration (details of ideas). Both in school and at home, children can be encouraged to look at tasks from different perspectives, to continue to work on improving an idea, and to add details and elaboration.

As we quickly approach the end of the school year I would like to provide a few reminders.

- 1) All medications in the clinic must be picked up by PARENTS prior to June 16t^h at 3pm. All medicines not picked up by this day and time must be discarded.
- 2) Students with medication needs, asthma, allergies, seizures or diabetes must submit new signed orders from a physician before the start of the next school year. All forms can be found on the <u>www.lcps.org</u> website. Click on the "parent tab" to find the forms listed under "Medication at School – for Parents". I may not administer any medicines without a doctor's order.
- 3) Students may not be in possession of over the counter or prescription medications at school. Medications must be brought to school by the PARENT and given to the clinic staff. There is a form that must be signed and it too is available at the above website or it can be filled out in the clinic. This does include cough drops.
- 4) All medications must be in their original containers. Over the counter medicines should be provided in unopened packages.
- 5) If you need any care plans I can provide you the paperwork. Please feel free to contact me at (571) 252-2940.

Rising 5th graders must have a TDAP documented BEFORE starting middle school. Please refer to your pediatrician. I can enter documentation if acquired before the end of the school year. Otherwise, please present it to the middle school your child will be attending.
